

The Government of Montenegro issued the urban planning and technical requirements for the construction of a photovoltaic park at seven locations in Lastva and Ubli near the country's historic capital of Cetinje. RES Montenegro Group has determined that the potential connection capacity is 506 MW and estimated the annual output at up to 750 GWh.

Montenegro has installed more than 8.5 MW of rooftop solar capacity to date, Zeljko Pekic, the manager of the Solari 3000+ and 500+ projects run by the power utility EPCG, told Montel on Sunday.

Over the period of one year Montenegro often has over 240 sunny days, thus the use of solar systems is the most ideal, most efficient and cleanest way to obtain energy. The intensity of solar radiation is among the highest in Europe, which creates ideal conditions for a serious energy transition by introducing solar thermal collectors and ...

Montenegro has witnessed the development of several solar power plants to exploit its solar potential. One prominent project is the Briska Gora solar park, located near Ulcinj, with an anticipated capacity to produce approximately 200 GWh of electricity annually.

Local authorities can benefit from subsidies to install solar panels and heat pumps in their buildings until 7 May 2024. Projects which are eligible for subsidies are for the use of renewable energy sources for on-grid production of electricity for self-consumption and energy efficient central heating systems.

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Montenegro's power transmission system operator CGES has so far signed six connection agreements for solar power projects. Their total peak capacity would amount to 1.64 GW in peak capacity. The investors are M Energy, Sun Horizon, Obnovljivi izvori energije, Solar Power, EE Korita and Agenos Energy

Montenegro has exceptional potential for the production of electricity based on the principle of the photovoltaic effect, which is why Elektroprivreda Crne Gore (EPCG) launched the Solari 5000+ project



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
