Iceland is a sovereign state with its own parliament, a president, currency, language, and laws. Greenland is an autonomous territory within the kingdom of Denmark. They do have some autonomy and, in addition to Danish, also speak Greenlandic, which is Eskimo - Aleut language spoken in Greenland, Alaska, and several other Arctic regions.

Based on the names alone, you'd probably assume the main difference between Iceland and Greenland is Iceland is colder than Greenland. However, the reality is Greenland is the much colder location -- with far more ice and snow to traverse.
